## <u>Events</u>

We have packed a lot in to this term. Some of the events and activities are described in this newsletter. Year 7 students ran a very successful Charity Week supporting the Foodbank and Year 11 are closing the term with theirs, supporting Cancer Research. Students have had many opportunities to see plays, years 7-10 have had a visiting band play a gig for them and there have been many sporting fixtures. We celebrated World Book Day with a range of competitions and there are Science Technology Engineering and Maths challenges running.

We've had a second set of Year 11 mock exams and students have had feedback that tells them the areas that are their strengths and



identifies what they need to work on to keep pushing their grades as high as they can be. From now on they will be intensely focused on revision, coursework completion and practical and written exams. We wish them all well.

# Student voice

Students, staff and governors have also been looking at some proposed changes to our school logo. We want to hear the student voice as we want to capture visually what we as a school stand for and the values we share. Governors and staff are also considering some future uniform changes. At the moment this is a discussion and firm decisions have not been made. If changes are made, they will come in with a future year 7 cohort. **No current student will need to replace any items of uniform.** The only changes that **will** affect our current students (and incoming year 7) are the rules about school shoes (no branded shoes or trainers from September, including no Nike shoes) and the enforcement of our existing rule about trousers: that they should not be skintight.

# Engagement

The year 9 options evening was very well attended and parents very much appreciated the opportunity to find out about GCSE options and chat to staff. It was good to be able to meet parents/carers at that evening and also vis the 'Meet the...' evenings that have continued this term. We have had some really constructive feedback from parents via these meetings and the governor meeting. Next term we are looking at the systems we use for communicating with parents/carers and for producing reports as we are considering how to improve these.

# Learning

Teaching staff have had some high-quality professional training this term. Some of the staff team have been training as coaches and we are excited about rolling this programme out. The coaching programme supports teachers in engaging with research evidence and finding ideas about how they can take their classroom practice and craft to the next level. Schools are learning communities: it isn't only the students who learn, staff enjoy learning too. Having said that, we will enjoy having a break too in order to rest and recharge ready for the summer term.

## Careers Update from Miss Boreham

Duke of Edinburgh Residential to the Isle of Wight In March a group of Year 9 students set off for the Isle of Wight to complete their Expedition on the Isle of Wight for the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award. After getting up early, travelling in the mini-bus with Mr Howkins and a ferry ride, students arrived at the UK Sailing Association. Students had lunch, and then got into their wetsuits and ventured into the water under the instruction of UKSA instructor Ted. In the evening students were then set the task of making something from clay to do with water for their evening activity. Some students made little islands, but the stand out was Archie's UKSA paddleboard, along with Jenn's squidward. Students then had a very competitive game of uno, with UKSA instructors Adem and Pabs getting involved too before it was time for bed. On day 2, after a full English breakfast,

students were given a treasure hunt by UKSA instructors Ella, Cat and Matt. They then developed their team working skills with several challenges: the first involving transporting a small ball through guttering and the second involved getting from one end of a length of tarmac to another by just using materials given to them and without touching

On the evenings of 12<sup>th</sup>-15<sup>th</sup> March 2024, the Auditorium was full of people eager to see the wholeschool production of Shrek the Musical. The show was captivating, dynamic, and remarkable, showcasing the great talent held by the students and production team



involved. I had high expectations before the performance, with the high standards of previous productions, and all were exceeded! ## RSC Lead Associate School Update:

As part of our Lead Associate School status with the Royal Shakespeare Company there have been lots of fantastic events and opportunities for our students this term.

Next Generation Backstage

Four of our Year 10 students were recently selected to take part in the RSC's Next Generation: Backstage programme, the RSCs talent development programme which aims to train the next generation of theatre makers. The *Backstage* programme aims to recruit young people who might benefit from the opportunity to work alongside professionals from the Technical and Production teams to develop their skills in areas



such as: Scenic Painting, Props, Costume, Lighting, Sound and Stage Management. This fantastic opportunity took the form of a residential visit to the RSC's base in Stratford-upon-Avon and included the opportunity to attend a performance of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream', as well as taking part in practical workshop sessions and rehearsals led by technicians and designers.



## Shakespeare Curriculum Toolkit

Earlier this term, three of our Year 9 students were selected to take part in a film focused around the play 'Macbeth' created by Royal Shakespeare Company in anticipation of the launch of their new 'Shakespeare Curriculum'. They spent the day working with a professional director and film crew, creating content for this new online resource which will be launched in schools across the UK later this year. The producer and director of the film were so impressed by all those who took part that they actually re-filmed some of the content which had been recorded in another school the day before, because it was felt that our students would do a much better job! They have also asked if they can return to us term to involve some more of our students in another film they will be making focused around another of Shakespeare's plays. A 'preview' of the film which was created will be made public on the RSC website later this year... we look forward to sharing this with you, so you can see for yourself the excellent work created by our talented students!

#### Sporting Success

As always, lots of successes with our sports teams this term: - Year 11s finished their school football journey with a competitive 3-2 victory against Stour Valley. A brace from Arda and a winning strike from Ben sealing the victory! A big thanks to AFC Sudbury for hosting. - Year 8 girls football team were drawn against Stowupland in the County Cup semi-final. They were up against an experienced side and found themselves 1-0 down at half time. A super goal from Julia found them drawing 1-1 at full time. Confidence was rightly high with Isabella in goal, going into penalties. 2 great saves in the shoot-out from Issi left OSA with an overall 5-4 win and the Year 8s through to the final! #### <u>Notices</u>

Reminder: From September 2024, all students will be required to wear proper school shoes and trainers will be not allowed. No externally branded footwear will be allowed, even if they are all black. This means that students will no longer be able to wear the Nike trainers. We have received a huge amount of positive feedback from parents since this initial announcement in December and hope that these changes will support parents in saving money. Traditional school shoes typically cost £30-£45, which is significantly less than many branded trainers.

#### ATTENDANCE:

A crucial foundation stone of GCSE exam success is excellent attendance. Many students with 100% attendance were rewarded with 'skip the queue' passes at the end of term. Whilst our school attendance is above the national average, that national figure is low. Students with less that 95% attendance are likely to have gaps in their learning and understanding that will impact on their future success.
