Duke of Edinburgh Award Expeditions

As the DofE Award continues to expand at OSA, this year has been a successful year for both Bronze and Silver awards in both Years 9 and 10. Prior to the Expeditions running students have been busy completing various other sections of their DofE Award doing awesome things like volunteering at local libraries, scout groups or litter picking; perfected skills like model making, ballet or languages; and completed physical challenges like running, walking and basketball training.

The Expedition for Silver took place earlier in the term and was split across the practice in Bures, Suffolk with the Expedition proper over the late May bank holiday weekend in North Walsham. The students involved completed the expedition and learnt important lessons about teamwork and resilience along the way.





In June, a determined and enthusiastic group of Year 9 and some Year 10 students successfully completed their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award Training and Qualifying Expedition in the picturesque countryside of Danbury, Essex. With temperatures predicted to exceed 30°C over the weekend, students were allowed to carry just the essentials in their rucksacks and plenty of water. The teams navigated a planned route that started around 7am in order to avoid the predicted heat of the midday. The students demonstrated some amazing skills of independence, teamwork, and resilience as they coped with the warm weather conditions and trekked across footpaths, fields, and hills. To top it off they camped overnight and cooked some amazing meals in teams. The expedition section of the DofE is designed to challenge participants both physically and mentally, and our students rose to the occasion brilliantly. Assessors were impressed by the teamwork, communication, and positive attitudes displayed throughout the weekends.

Many of the students have reflected and remarked on how much they had learned, not only about navigation and outdoor skills, but also about themselves and the power of working as a team. Scholars Programme

In the spring and summer terms of Year 8, two of our scholars programmes have successfully completed their Graduation, as part of their university access programme, run by education charity The Brilliant Club. Our hard-working students in Year 8 have produced a challenging university-style essay overseen by a PhD mentor Gayle Overton, who visited the academy for their weekly tutorials.

As part of the programme, Year 8 students were encouraged to think and work independently across their seven tutorials with a subject expert, learning about Social Science: *The secret to living a long and happy life,* to produce a challenging final essay which was given a university-level grade.

The Scholars Programme supports students to develop the knowledge, skills and confidence needed to progress to the country's most competitive universities and succeed

when they get there.

The Scholars Programme has enabled students at OSA to work with a PhD researcher, learn beyond the core curriculum and helped them to develop key skills for university and later in life, such as critical thinking. Beyond their graduation, these students have lots more to look forward to, as the programme has proven impact on university progression rates. UCAS evaluation has found that Scholars Programme graduates are significantly more likely to progress to a competitive university when they have taken part in the programme.

As our scholars programme continues into the autumn term, with our third group of students, we can already reflect on both the spring and summer students' hard work who have taken part. As Head of Year, I have already seen a positive impact on pupils' confidence, their engagement and their increased knowledge about university. We have recently received our first impact report for our spring term group, and I look forward to receiving the summer impact report soon.

"It was great to see that Ormiston Sudbury pupils made significant progress from their baseline assignments to the final assignments, with growth in their written communication, subject knowledge and critical thinking. This culminated in some excellent final assignment grades with all pupils achieving a 1st or 2:1 grade,



demonstrating the hard work they put into the programme". Gayle Overton, from the University of Suffolk who worked with our students said:

"It was a pleasure delivering The Scholars Programme at Ormiston Sudbury Academy. All students showed a commitment and interest in the course from the beginning, which was evidenced by the high attendance at tutorials and the active participation within them. Students continuously displayed a determination to succeed, and that determination was clearly demonstrated in tutorial 5. In tutorial 5, students excellently presented their 'big idea' even though presentations were out of their comfort zone. Also, with the help of a very supportive lead teacher, all students submitted all assignments on time. I cannot praise the students and staff at Ormiston Sudbury Academy enough and I wish them all the best for the future."

Our students in Year 8 have showed a great work ethic and determination to succeed which was demonstrated by their high attendance at tutorials

and their willingness to give new things a go. As a result, students made outstanding progress and as Head of Year I am very proud of the work achieved from the spring and summer groups. Students really did get out of the programme what they put in and thoroughly deserve their achievements. I look forward to working with our third group of students, in the autumn term. Safeguarding Partnership and the Suffolk Public Health and Communities Team, The Drummer Boy uses drama as a powerful tool to communicate such challenging and emotive issues, raising awareness of the problems and, importantly, of the available support.

Although the play is highly emotional at times, it ends positively, with the lead character having reached out for help. Our students were an engaged and considerate audience throughout. They are aware of where to access support both in and out of school, and their tutors delivered a follow-up session to discuss what they had understood about the performance and address any misconceptions.

RSC Playmaking Festival

In June, a group of talented Year 9 and 10 students from Ormiston Sudbury Academy took to the stage at the Mercury Theatre in Colchester, performing a powerful extract from *King Lear* as part of the Royal Shakespeare Company's (RSC) Playmaking Festival.

This exciting opportunity forms part of OSA's ongoing involvement in the RSC Associate Schools Programme, a national initiative designed to give young people access to highquality drama education by connecting schools with the RSC and professional theatre practitioners.

The Playmaking Festival brought together over 240 young people from schools across the East of England to create a collective

production of *King Lear*. Ahead of the performance, OSA students took part in exclusive masterclasses led by professional directors from the RSC. These sessions challenged and inspired our students, helping them to refine their performance and deepen their understanding of Shakespearean theatre.

The day was not without its challenges, but our students handled everything with professionalism, focus, and determination. Their performance stood out as a true highlight of the festival, earning high praise from audience members, theatre staff, and RSC directors alike. One RSC practitioner described it as, *"one of the best performances of Shakespeare from students that I have ever seen, and I see a lot, from all over the country."*

Careers Update

Trips and Workshops

The Summer Term is always a busy time getting ready for work experience and completing pre-placement checks and interviews with students. However, we have still managed to ensure that students have the opportunity to visit various educational establishments to help them plan for their post 16 transition. In May, fifty Year 10 students visited Colchester Institute to find out about the range of pathways available to them at the College and tour the facilities. Some of our students also visited Abbeygate 6th Form for a Higher Education morning delivered by Cambridge University and Easten Education Group.

In July, tutors from West Suffolk College's T Level in Construction Design, Surveying and Planning, ran a workshop to encourage 'women into construction' at the Academy. Twenty of our students participated in the workshop to find out more about the construction industry, how they are keen to encourage more women into the industry and what different skills women can bring into the workplace.

Ninety Year 10 students attended the University of Essex's Insight Days this month. Students attend on two separate days and participated in university lectures in a range of subject areas including Psychodynamics, Criminology, Sports Rehabilitation and Life Sciences. They also got to tour the facilities and find out about university life – supporting them to make informed decisions about going onto higher education in the future.

Work experience July 2025

Our work experience programme for Year 10 students ran once again during the second week in July. Building on the previous year's success we managed to get 93% of our students out on placement for between 3-5 days.

We had a great response from local business and organisations willing to support this programme and a majority of our students managed to source their own placements working at local businesses in and around Sudbury. Some of our student travelled much further afield to Transport for London and John Lewis Head Office, London. We had students in a wide range of sectors including education, trades, charities, retail and hospitality and health and social care. We also had some fantastic students working in the Academy supporting our IT department, with Year 6 transition and as classroom assistants with the younger year groups.



Feedback from employers has been really positive about our young people and it was great to visit some of them in the workplace and hear how professional and hard working they have been. Some students have the opportunity to go back during the summer break, or to help next year when they have finished their GCSEs. We are very grateful to the employers that supported our students on what for many of them will be their first experiences of the workplace and helps them to start developing those important work-based skills that they can build on for the future.

Over the course of my journey through year 8, I have learnt some wonderful things about history. In this term, I have been learning about World War 1 and how the economy either suffered or improved after the first world war in America. In our first lesson about World War 1 we learnt about the long term and short-term causes and why the countries wanted to go to war in the first place. We then learnt about life in the trenches during World War 1 and how the soldiers had to survive for months in dirty, lice-infested, damp trenches with the bare minimum. We then learnt about the battle of the Somme and the Schlieffen plan and how they failed so miserably. After World War 1 there was a time for America known as the 1920s Golden age. During this decade-long economic boom, the white middle class saw huge improvements in their everyday



lives. These improvements were fewer working hours, more pay, more affordable luxury items such as cars and entertainment, and women were finally allowed to vote thanks to the suffragettes. Although the majority of people were enjoying their new and improved lives, there were people who weren't so lucky. Groups such as farmers, people of colour and the working-class families. This is because of something called Laissez-Faire. This is where the government doesn't care about helping people with less money and less rights. This usually leads to businesses being able to get away with what they want and keep the poor poorer and make the rich even richer than they already are.
